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THE RESIDENCE GUARANTEE

A Place for *Everyone*

You are invited to become an important part of our residence community, where Western students live and learn together.

If you are a single student coming directly from high school and have received an offer of full-time, first year admission to Western University's Main Campus by mid-May, then **accommodation is GUARANTEED.**

Students transferring from other institutions or receiving their offer after mid-May, are invited to complete a residence application and join our wait list.

Scholarship recipients receiving awards from Western's National Scholarship Program*, the Schulich Leader Scholarship and the National Indigenous Scholarship are guaranteed single-room accommodation in their first and second year.

Recipients of the Western Scholarship of Excellence, are guaranteed one of their top three choices of residence building in their first and second year. Students will automatically be considered for the Western Scholarship of Excellence if they are admitted to an undergraduate

program at Western's Main Campus directly from secondary school and are registered in first year full-time studies. No application is required.

All international students are guaranteed a space in residence during their first and second year of study at Western.

Recipients of the Welcome-to-Canada Scholarship will be guaranteed a space in residence for their first and second year.

If you are a high school student on a study permit in Canada and a recipient of Western's Continue-in-Canada Admission Scholarship, you will be guaranteed a space in residence for all four years of your undergraduate studies, in addition to a scholarship of \$40,000 over four years.

The fine print:

All residence guarantees listed above are contingent upon meeting our eligibility requirements and deadlines.

First-year students who do not meet our guaranteed offer requirements are still eligible to apply to the residence waiting list if they are single and are academically admissible for full-time studies on Main Campus.

Students registering at Huron or King's University College or those enrolled in the Western-Fanshawe Collaborative BScN Program who start at the Fanshawe site are not eligible for residence at Western's Main Campus.

Students with families are encouraged to contact Platt's Lane Estates, our University-owned family accommodation.

Information, policies and procedures contained in this document are subject to change, pending new guidance and recommendations from the University and/or local/provincial/federal agencies and leaders.

Academic edge

Students who live in residence are more successful academically. There are many programs in residence that support your academic efforts—'Professor Meet and Greet' events, exam review sessions, peer study groups and academic skills workshops—all right where you live!

Clean and cared-for facilities

We are continually upgrading and renovating our buildings to ensure that you can enjoy high-quality, well-equipped accommodations. We also provide regular cleaning of common areas on your floor every day.

Convenient and easy access

Living on campus means that you are always close to your classes, campus services and co-curricular involvement opportunities. Meeting with a professor or studying in the library is only a short walk away.

Dining at ease

Our eight residence dining halls offer easy access to a diverse range of dining options. Our chefs prepare a wide selection of food in-house so there's always something new to try. You can dine in on campus, order in or dine out with our off-campus meal plan partners—all on your residence meal plan!

Focus on safety

Every residence has a front desk that's only a call away, live-in Residence Dons that are here to support, Residence Safety Assistants that respond to overnight concerns and guest registration tables which are set up on the weekends. Someone is always available to help. Western Special Constables provide 24/7 patrols and emergency response service 365 days a year, while Foot Patrol provides safe escorts to walk students to their destinations on main campus and the Affiliate University Colleges at night. Western also has a Student Emergency Response Team which responds to on-campus medical emergencies.

Growing your leadership skills

Expand your personal and professional skills through involvement in numerous academic, social, cultural and recreational activities just steps away from your door! Through a variety of events, you can gain valuable leadership skills to help you land your dream job. Traditional-Style Residence

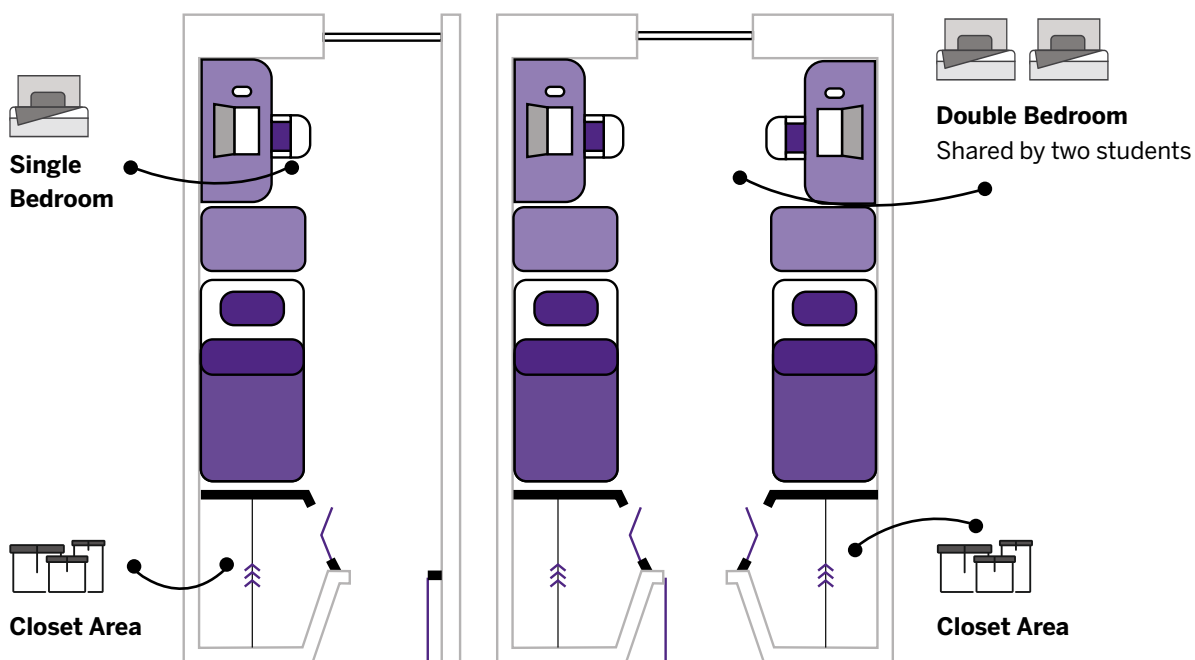
Delaware Hall | Medway-Sydenham Hall |
Saugeen-Maitland Hall

A combination of single and double rooms along a hallway where residents share common washrooms with members of their floor community. Washrooms are separate for men and women and some floors have additional all-gender washrooms depending on the building.

- Most economical room rate
- Easy to make friends and meet others
- Strong sense of community and belonging
- Floor washrooms with private showers are cleaned daily
- About 30 students on each floor

We offer single-gender rooms in traditional-style buildings. Mixed-gender rooms are only offered if students explicitly request the option.

Note: All floor plans are for illustrative purposes only and may not reflect the exact layout of every residence building.



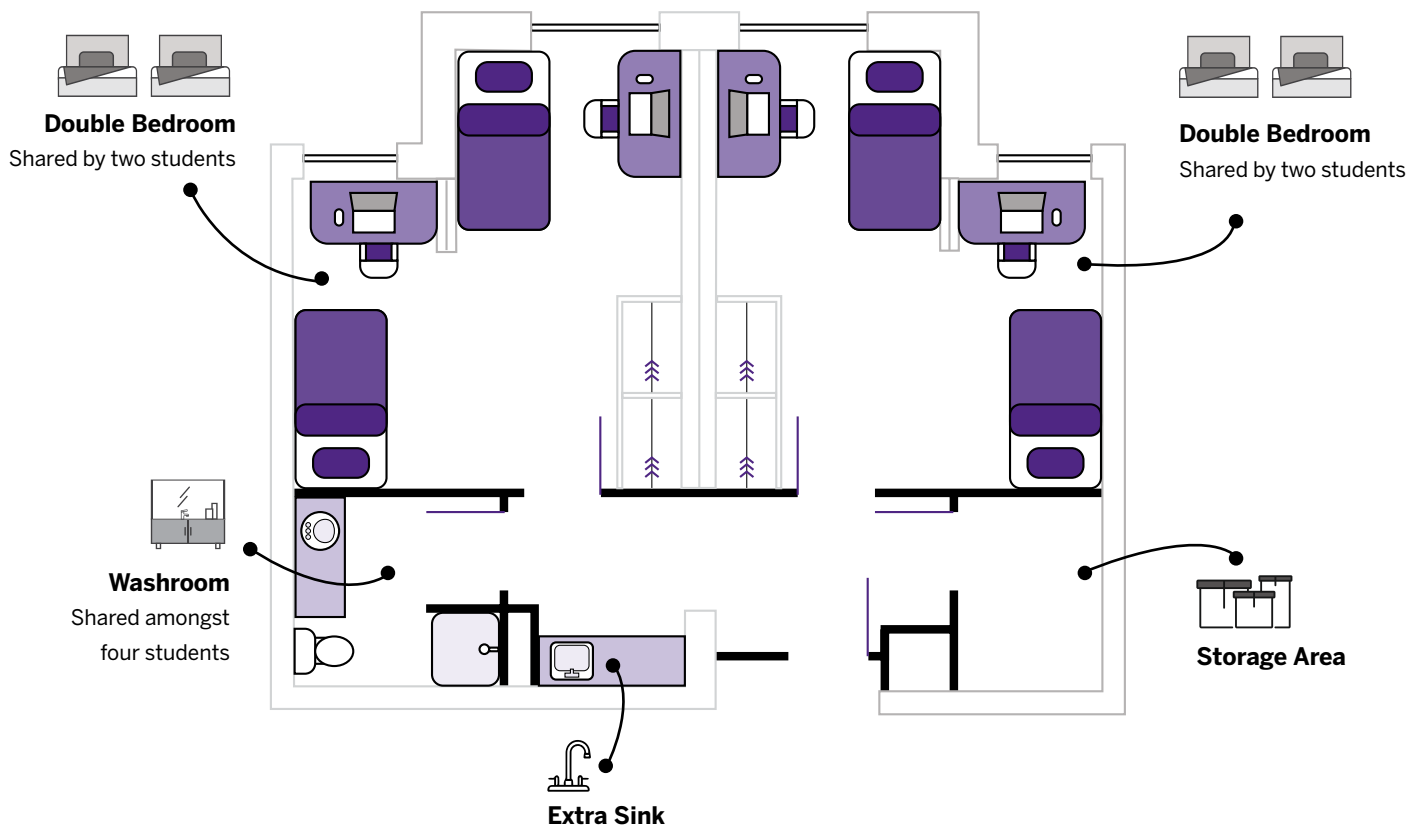
Hybrid-Style Residence

Bayfield Hall | Clare Hall | Ontario Hall | Perth Hall

Mostly double rooms (and some singles) where students share a bedroom and a private washroom. Bayfield Hall suites also contain a shared kitchen and living area.

- Strong sense of community similar to traditional-style
- Extra storage in common area of semi-suite
- Extra common-area sink in semi-suites with double rooms
- Cleaning supplies available at front desks

Clare Hall is an all-women residence. Mixed-gender rooms or suites are only offered in buildings if students explicitly request the option.



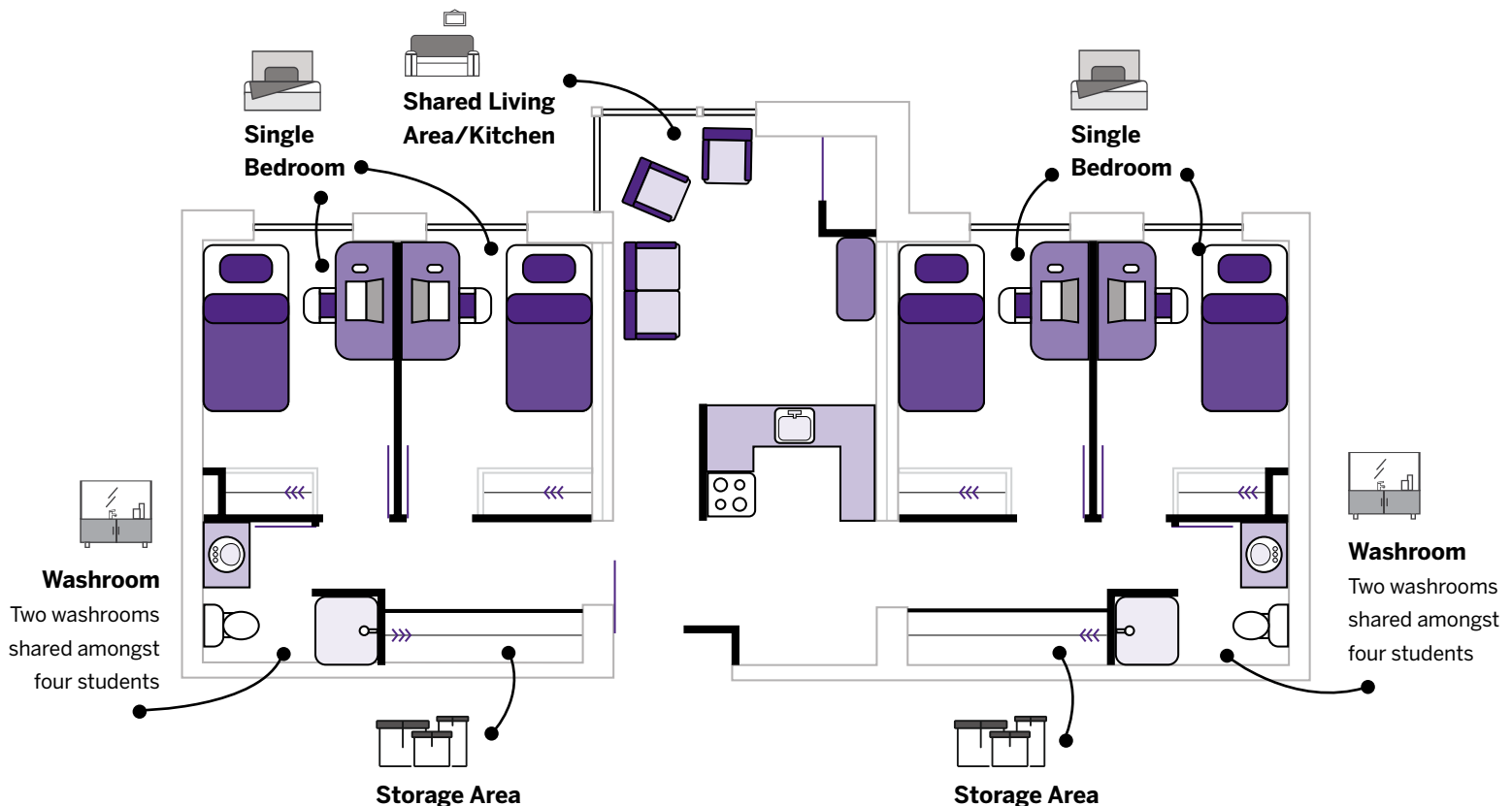
Suite-Style Residence

Elgin Hall | Essex Hall | Lambton Hall |
Alumni House | London Hall

Two, three or four single rooms form a suite and share a kitchenette and living area, as well as one or two washrooms, depending on the building.

- Geared towards independent living with more domestic responsibilities
- Has increased privacy with individual bedrooms and fewer students sharing washroom facilities
- Shared kitchen and living area space
- Cleaning supplies available at front desks

We offer single-gender and mixed-gender suites depending on students' identified preferences.





How to Choose Your Residence

HOW ARE RESIDENCES ASSIGNED?

We ask you to rank all of our residences, from most-desired to least-desired, on your Residence Placement Questionnaire. Consider the style of residence, single- or mixed-gender room options, cost and the Living-Learning Community offerings. There are some single rooms available, though we can't guarantee this option.

Building assignments are made using a computer-generated number, randomly assigned to each student. Placement is based on your ranked preferences of buildings. If your most preferred residence in your ranked list is filled by the time your number is picked, you will be assigned to the next available residence in your list of preferences.

HOW DO I RANK MY RESIDENCE CHOICES?

We offer the same programs and activities in every residence. More importantly, the same strong sense of community and belonging develops among members of each floor community in all the residences, big or small. You will be able to walk to the centre of campus in ten minutes from any residence. If you don't get one of your top choices, not to worry as each residence building offers a close-knit community, unique culture and opportunities to take advantage of!

HOW DO YOU MATCH ROOMMATES?

We make every effort to match people with similar lifestyle habits, such as whether they study with or without music in the background, whether they prefer to go to bed early, how often they clean their room and more, based on their answers on the Residence Placement Questionnaire.

We respect that a person may wish to live with students irrespective of their or others' gender identity or expression. Both single-gender and mixed-gender rooms and suites are available for students to choose from when you fill in the online Residence Placement Questionnaire at myhousing.uwo.ca.

Please note that attitudes towards smoking, vaping, cannabis and alcohol use along with age, take precedence in the placement process over other lifestyle habits.

HOW DO I GUARANTEE MY ROOMMATE?

First-year incoming students may request one roommate in any style of building to form a roommate group of two. To be part of a guaranteed roommate group, both members must receive guaranteed residence offers. Additionally, they must submit their residence prepayment and complete the Residence Placement Questionnaire by the June deadline. Both roommates need to join the same roommate group on the myHousing Portal. Depending which roommate sends the request, please ensure you return to the 'Roommate Groups' section in your residence application to accept the request to join the roommate group. To ensure a compatible living experience, it is strongly recommended that roommates discuss their building preferences and lifestyle choices.

About Mixed-Gender Housing in Residence

If you select the option for 'Mixed-Gender Suites' in the online Residence Placement Questionnaire, we will not consider your gender identity when placing you in a suite with other students. You will be matched with someone based on lifestyle preferences (tidiness, study habits, etc.).

As a result, you might be assigned a suitemate(s) of the same gender, or with someone whose gender identity is different than yours. Mixed-gender housing is an opt-in process and accommodation will be available based on demand.

Although we are happy to support students who choose mixed-gender housing in all room styles, we find that it works best in suite-style and single-hybrid style. Should you wish to live in mixed-gender housing in a shared double-bedroom, reach out to housing@uwo.ca to manage your request.

Clare Hall is an all-women residence. Mixed-gender housing option is not available in this building.

Please note that your gender preference only applies to your suite. All but a few of our floors and residences are mixed-gender.

Academic Success in Residence

Learning is not limited to opening a book or participating in a lecture. We learn from every moment, situation and personal encounter.

Western promotes a residence atmosphere that's conducive to sleep and study at all times. Our staff are available to respond to any noise disturbances that might occur. Residence Life Staff and Sophs help floormates set guidelines to maintain a mutual level of respect and understanding of one another's need for an environment that encourages academic study.

- 24-hour quiet hours are strictly enforced during exam periods, while 11:00 p.m.–8:00 a.m. quiet hours are set for regular school nights
- Structured programs are run throughout the year to connect you with others in your classes and with professors from your faculty and program

- Organized study groups and academic support sessions are available throughout the year
- In addition to the wired internet service in your bedroom, wireless service is available in all residences

Studying for university takes personal discipline and self-management skills no matter where you live. Give yourself an academic edge by living and learning in residence!

Study Rooms

Enjoy a casual, relaxed setting where you can work on your studies with some friendly support right in your residence. Residence Education Advisors (REAs) regularly use these spaces to meet one-on-one with students and run workshops designed to help students succeed academically.



Our Learning Goals

We want you to get the most out of your experience at Western—and living in residence is the start of that journey. Residence events and programs are designed with three key learning goals in mind that will teach you how to thrive in university and in life after graduation.



Intellectual Engagement: Through interactions with faculty, staff and peers, you will be challenged to think critically, apply knowledge and connect classroom learning to life experiences.



Citizenship: By living in a community, exploring new cultures and learning more about social issues, you'll discover and refine your perspective, individuality and impact on society.



Self-Awareness: Learn to reflect on personal growth and change—whether it be physical, psychological, social or intellectual and gain the ability to recognize a realistic self-concept relating to confidence, integrity and personal limitations.

Living-Learning Communities

One of our most effective, high-impact and immersive programs in residence.

Living-Learning Communities (LLCs) are floors in residence for students that want to live with other students that may share commonalities with them. There are floors designed for students who share a faculty/program and others targeted to those who share similar interests, identities and/or lived experiences.

LLCs are developed to give students a more enriched living and learning environment, combining academic integration, personal development and community engagement.

LLCs offer students additional benefits, including:

- An easy way to meet peers who share the same interests and academic goals
- Easier access to study groups and social events
- Programs and events tailored to fit their needs, goals and interests

- Multiple upper-year mentors who have shared lived experiences
- Enhanced opportunities for career and life-skill development
- Experiential learning opportunities connected with their community
- An increased sense of belonging in a particularly supportive environment

All LLCs are optional for students and there is no additional cost to live on any of these floors.

Do you feel passionate about expanding your knowledge in the area of gender identity, sexuality and social issues? The 2SLGBTQ+ and Ally Community welcomes all members of the Twospirited, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Transsexual, Queer and Questioning community, and their Allies (those who support and positively affirm all members of the Queer community). This community offers a supportive environment for students questioning their gender and/or sexuality, advocates for 2SLGBTQ+ rights and strives for an environment where all residents feel celebrated and empowered.



Lifestyle-Based Floors

In addition to our Living-Learning Communities, we also offer Lifestyle-Based Floors. Students who share the same lifestyle can choose to live together on these floors, available in Saugeen-Maitland Hall and Medway-Sydenham Hall.

Substance-free floors are for students (regardless of age) who commit to a substance-free lifestyle and want to live among others who have chosen the same. Each member on the floor is responsible for maintaining the integrity of this option.

Quieter lifestyle floors are for those who prefer to live in an environment with greater restrictions on noise. Standards for quiet are set by the residents of each floor.

Clare Hall is an all-women residence, based on demand.

Selection Process

If you are interested in applying to one or more of the Living-Learning Communities or Lifestyle-Based Floors, please indicate your preferences in the online Residence Placement Questionnaire. You will be placed accordingly, based on availability.

Students who apply to our 2SLGBTQ+ and Ally Community answer brief questions to assist in the placement process.

All of these floors are arranged as demand dictates. Certain options may not be offered if we don't have sufficient student interest to fill a full floor. While we do our best, we cannot guarantee placement on the floor of your choice.

LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Stay Involved and Grow Your *Leadership Skills*

At Western, we believe that experiential learning plays an important role in students' academic success.

There are hundreds of student leadership positions available in residence—from Residents' Council to Residence Life Staff positions. By taking advantage of these opportunities, you will be able to leverage your skills, gain valuable experience and provide assistance to others, while also developing applicable leadership competencies for your future career.

Residence Dons

Residence Dons are part-time, upper-year student leaders who are here to build community, mentor and support students in residence. Each community is assigned a Residence Don who

lives on the floor and serves as a link between students and the University. Their number one priority is to help make your Western experience the best it can be by answering questions, organizing activities, connecting you to campus resources and upholding residence policies.

Residence Education Advisors

Residence Education Advisors (REAs) are part-time, upper-year student leaders, trained to provide the support and assistance students need to make their academic transition to university successful.

Residents' Council

Residents' Council are elected or selected representatives of the residents. They organize social activities and programs including intramural sports, formals, special outings and study groups.

Residence Sophs

Residence Orientation Leaders, also known as 'Residence Sophs', are upper-year students who volunteer their time to share their own experience and help first-year students in their transition to university. Sophs are known as the 'spirit keepers' on campus, energizing students during Orientation Week, facilitating move-ins in September and providing peer support throughout the year.

Connect-IT Support Team

The team provides technical support to students in residence. This part-time position for upper-year students combines customer service experience and an opportunity to apply technical skills acquired during our annual staff training in August. The benefits of working with this team include competitive compensation, training, on-campus location, flexible hours, a student-run environment and an opportunity to expand your technical skills.

Front Desk Staff

Front Desk Staff look after our reception areas in the residence building lobbies. They provide front-line customer service, answer phones 24/7, greet guests, issue replacement keys, coordinate mail deliveries, dispatch on-duty Residence Life Staff to handle concerns and take maintenance requests. Part-time hours available for students.

Guest Registration

Guest Registration Staff are responsible for supporting Housing's Visitor Policy, by ensuring the students entering Western's main campus residences are registered residence students and/or registered guests. Staff are stationed at residence entrances during evenings, weekends and other high-traffic times. Part-time hours available for students.

HAS Street Team

Street Team members are part-time student staff who support the Division of Housing and Ancillary Services (HAS). They use their campus experience to lead residence tours, conduct surveys, create social media content and promote campus services such as apparel and meal plans.

We are here to *Support*

The Housing Office team of professionals are experienced in dealing with students' transition from high school to university life. We are committed to creating a supportive residence community that maximizes your potential for success.

Office of Residence Education and Programs

The Office of Residence Education and Programs (OREP) works with Student Experience, Western International, the University Students' Council and other departments on campus to organize various social and learning activities to create an engaging environment for residents to support their transition to university life.

Residence Life Coordinators

Residence Life Coordinators are full-time employees of the University who live and work in the residences. They are responsible for promoting an atmosphere of academic achievement, community living, as well as the enhancement of student learning outside of the classroom.

Residence Safety Coordinators

Residence Safety Coordinators are responsible for the afterhours emergency and safety responses in residence and regularly liaise with partners such as Campus Safety and Emergency Services. Their primary focus is on community management and student support and can help connect residents to supports on campus and in the London community.

Residence Safety Assistants

Residence Safety Assistants are full-time staff members dedicated to the community management and student support needs during peak periods of student activity including evenings, overnights and weekends. They conduct regular rounds of the buildings and help connect students

to resources, as well as respond to concerns such as noise complaints and emergencies in residence.

Residence Counselling & Student Support

Residence Counselling offers confidential counselling services, free of charge, to students living in residence on a wide variety of issues including (but not limited to): adjustment to university, anxiety, depression, academic stress, motivation, grief, sexuality, gender identity, relationships, suicidal thoughts, self-harm, social skills, self-esteem and greater understanding of self. Our team of mental health professionals works closely with other campus departments to promote coordinated services for students living in residence and can facilitate referrals to specialized services when needed.

Facilities Management

Facilities Management Staff work during the day to ensure a clean and well-maintained living environment. They are also responsible for repairs and maintenance work.

Residence Conduct

Residence is the largest classroom on campus. When concerns arise regarding student behaviour, Residence Conduct staff members work with the student to educate about harm reduction and ensure they have the best experience possible. On occasion, conduct staff members also use a restorative approach to address harm to the community.

Dining Hall Staff & Registered Dietitian

Dining Hall Staff prepare your meals and snacks throughout the day and our Registered Dietitian can help answer any nutrition questions that you may have. Our chefs at the interactive stations will cook customized meals for you.



Residence Dining

Our dining halls serve diverse, globally inspired, homemade meals using locally sourced ingredients when possible.

Convenience

We're proud to offer eight conveniently located residence dining halls—you are never more than a few minutes' walk away from your closest dining hall. You can also use your meal plan at any of our residence dining halls, so it's easy to share meals with your friends from other buildings—you'll love the convenience!

Choices and flexibility

Check out our selection of affordable, à la carte menu options. You choose, and pay for, as much or as little of an item as you wish! Each dining hall features hot entrées prepared in-house by our skilled culinary teams, a full fruit and salad bar, deli bar, sushi, soups and convenient grab-and-go items.

Tailored to your dietary needs

It's easy to make healthy food choices in our residence dining halls, even for students with dietary restrictions. Our menus feature a wide variety of options including several plant-based, allergen-friendly, gluten free and halal selections. To assist students with managing their dietary and allergen needs, dietary and Health Canada's priority allergen identifiers are displayed throughout the serveries to help you make an informed decision. This makes it easier for students with dietary restrictions to find safe foods.

At Western, we support students living with food allergies. If you have a food allergy or other dietary restriction, we strongly encourage you to self-identify. UNDERSTANDING YOUR MEAL PLAN

Meal Plan

Residence meal plan is comprised of two main components: the overhead fee and the food credit.

Overhead Fee

The overhead fee is used to maintain and operate the dining halls. This includes labour, capital costs, equipment, etc. There is no food credit value to the overhead fee and it is non-refundable.

Food Credit

There are two types of food credit in your meal plan— Residence Dollars and Flex Dollars:

- **Residence Dollars** are used at residence dining halls and on-campus eateries. The cost of food purchased in the residence dining halls is reduced and tax-exempt to reflect that the overhead has been paid. When purchasing at on-campus eateries, you will pay full retail price but tax-exemption still applies.
- **Flex Dollars** can be used for on-campus vending machines and at our meal plan partner restaurants found both on and off campus. Many take-out/delivery options are available. Off-campus flex purchases are subject to full retail price plus applicable taxes.

WILL MY MEAL PLAN CREDIT LAST ALL YEAR?

Whether the meal plan will cover all of your meals for the academic year very much depends on your eating habits. As a light to average eater, if you purchase the majority of your meals in residence, the food credit should last for the academic year. You can add more food credit online at any time and are not required to pay further overhead costs when doing so.

WHAT IF I HAVE FOOD CREDIT LEFT OVER BY THE END OF THE YEAR?

At the end of the academic year, any unused food credit (Residence Dollars and Flex Dollars) can be transferred to a campus meal plan for the following year. Alternatively, you may request any unused food credits to be applied as a credit back to your Student Center account. Remember, the overhead fee is non-refundable. Visit food.uwo.ca/meal-plan for more information on meal plan options for your second year and beyond.

DINE IN OR OUT

You may use your Flex Dollars to order in-home delivery (for example, pizza), to make selections from vending machines in residence and on campus or to dine at selected local restaurants that are our meal plan partners. When using your Flex Dollars for these options, alcoholic beverages are excluded and you pay regular retail prices (which include overhead costs and are subject to applicable taxes for off-campus purchases).

HOW DO I USE MY MEAL PLAN?

Your Western ONECard functions as both your student identification and your meal card. Your account will be credited with your full year's Residence Dollars and Flex Dollars prior to your arrival. The meal plan program is based on a **declining balance system**, meaning that when you buy food, the purchase amount will be deducted from the balance on your Western ONECard. You are in control of your own food credit budget and have complete flexibility in menu selection and eating times.

By eating the majority of your meals in the residence dining halls, your food credit will last much longer.





Connect to Internet

We provide you with a high-speed wired connection in your room as well as wireless internet connectivity throughout your residence building.

What should I bring with me to residence?

Our wired service provides the highest quality service and is the best connection for academic work, financial transactions and gaming. You need to bring an Ethernet cable in order to connect your laptop to our high-speed wired network.

Our convenient wireless service is best suited for casual smart phone, tablet or laptop use. If your computer does not have an ethernet port, you will also need to bring an external network adapter with you to residence.

What type of computer do I need to connect?

Almost any computer can connect! Our staff support computers with all current versions of Windows, macOS and Chrome OS.

What if I need help?

Our excellent student support team is available on move-in days to help you get connected! Our friendly staff and hotline are also available throughout the year to answer questions related to internet in residence. On your move-in day, you will also receive an Internet Connection Guide that contains instructions to help you connect your devices.

Do I need to sign up for anything?

No, all students living in residence receive wired internet service in their bedroom and wireless service throughout their building. This is all included in your room fee at no extra charge.



Having a reliable, high-speed internet connection helps you keep on top of your academics. If you ever need assistance, our team is available seven days a week to keep you connected.



SAFETY AND SECURITY

Safety is a Shared Responsibility

In Residence:

- Front Desk Staff are available 24 hours a day by phone and in-person at residence front desks
- Access to buildings is restricted 24/7 by locked doors controlled by card access
- At designated times, guests must show valid photo ID, be signed in at the front desk upon entry to the residence and be accompanied by their host resident of the building at all times
- Residence Staff are available to respond to emergencies within the residence

On Campus:

Alert WesternU

Western is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy campus. Alert WesternU, powered by OnSolve MIR3, is Western's emergency mass notification system. Alert WesternU will quickly notify students, faculty and staff of emergencies that could present a threat to personal safety. All Western Main Campus and affiliate students, faculty and staff with a current @uwo.ca email address are automatically enrolled in the system.

In an emergency, immediate notification is crucial. Text to your mobile device is

quicker than email. Consider adding a text number to your Alert WesternU account using your Western ID login credentials at alert.westernu.ca.

Campus Safety & Emergency Services (CSES)

Western Special Constables are responsible for law enforcement and provide emergency and routine response on campus 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Western Special Constables support many community services and programs to help meet the safety needs of Western's diverse community, including personal safety and responsible drinking presentations, theft prevention tips, bicycle registration, security audits and safety-related print materials.

Emergency Blue Phones

Located throughout campus, emergency blue phones provide fast, free and direct communication to Campus Safety & Emergency Services in the event of a need for immediate assistance.

Residence Staff

Residence Staff are available to respond to emergencies and student concerns at all hours. During the day, Residence Life Coordinators and Residence

Area Managers ensure safety and the coordination of support. Overnight, each Residence has a dedicated safety team of Residence Safety Assistants and Residence Safety Coordinators who promote a sense of safety and security within the residences.

Student Emergency Response Team (SERT)

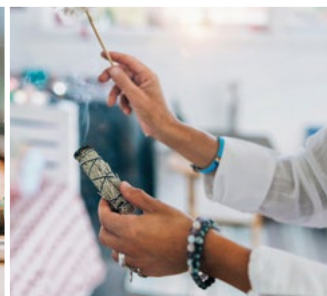
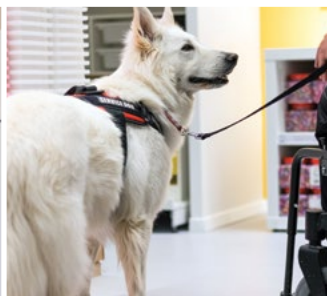
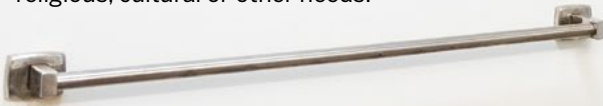
SERT is a student-run volunteer organization affiliated with Western Student Health Services. SERT responds to all medical emergencies on campus 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Recognized by the Ministry of Health as the first responder for Western, SERT is dispatched directly through Campus Safety & Emergency Services by calling 83300 from any campus phone or residence front desk. SERT services are completely free to use.

Western Foot Patrol

Foot Patrol is a free service that provides walk-safe escorts, deters crime through patrols and promotes safety awareness. Students can request a safe escort on the Main Campus and Affiliated University College campuses any day of the week. The program welcomes volunteers and accepts applications from students, staff and faculty.

Accessibility in Residence

Western Housing makes every reasonable effort to accommodate the needs of our residents who are members of a protected group and/or fall under a protected ground of discrimination. Our goal is to foster a sense of belonging for all students, including those with special needs or requirements. Accommodations may be granted based on physical, medical, mental, financial, dietary, religious, cultural or other needs.



Most of our residences are accessible to people with differing physical abilities. Clare Hall, Essex Hall, Elgin Hall, London Hall, Perth Hall and Ontario Hall have incorporated a number of barrier-free design features, including some specially-designed suites.

It is important to review our website (residence.uwo.ca/experience/accessibility) for detailed information on our

request criteria, as well as how to make a request in the myHousing Portal. Requests must be received by the Housing Office on or before June 4, 2025.

We caution that our residences may not be suitable for individuals with severe allergies, dietary or health-related concerns, or serious mental health concerns that require extraordinary accommodation.



Live on Campus After First Year

You can continue living in residence in your upper years and enjoy the benefits that it has to offer. Live a minute's walk from class with easy access to the gym and library. Take advantage of the flexibility to choose how you dine. Enjoy a homecooked meal or avoid doing those dishes by eating in the dining hall. You can also rest easy not having to worry about paying utilities or internet each month. With Western

as your landlord, those items are taken care of along with any repairs needed.

Be sure to apply early when applications open on the myHousing Portal in November, as upper-year residence operates on a first-come, first-served basis, with a guaranteed single room.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Residence Admissions

The majority of first-year students are accommodated in double rooms, as they offer an increased opportunity to meet new friends and become part of a close-knit community.



How are residences assigned?

Assignments are made based on a computer-generated random number assigned to each student. Some of the residences may be filled by the time your number is reached. You will then be assigned to the next available residence on your list of preferences, as indicated in your Residence Placement Questionnaire responses. Students should be prepared to be placed in any of our 12 residences as there may only be availability in the student's twelfth choice depending on their computer-generated random number.

We also consider the information that you provide, including lifestyle information, building and roommate preferences, and other information you tell us about yourself.

When will I find out my building placement?

You will be informed in late July of your residence placement and will find out your room assignment a few days before move-in. If Housing is assigning your roommate, you will meet them upon arrival in September. We reserve the right to assign rooms based on availability, including combining multiple residents into rooms within reasonable limits of safety and comfort, in situations of high demand.

What if I have a preferred roommate?

You may request one roommate in any style of building. You will be placed with a requested roommate provided that:

- You both receive residence offers, submit your Residence prepayment and complete your Residence Placement Questionnaires before the deadline
- You both join the same roommate group in the myHousing Portal
- You both rank your preferences identically

Please note: You and your requested roommate must be in the same faculty/program in order to be placed together on a faculty-based Living-Learning Community floor.

Once you know your residence assignment in late July, if you and your requested roommate have been assigned to Elgin Hall, Essex Hall, Perth Hall, Ontario Hall or Alumni House, and you wish to share a suite with other students who have also been placed in the same residence, each student needs to forward a request to the Housing Office at housing@uwo.ca by the deadline. Requests for groups of three can only be accommodated for students placed in London Hall.

What are my chances of getting a single-room placement?

The five suite-style residences, Alumni House, Elgin Hall, Essex Hall, Lambton Hall and London Hall are comprised of two, three or four single bedrooms in each suite. In addition, traditional and hybrid-style residences also offer limited single rooms.

You may indicate your preference for a single room by checking the appropriate box on the online Residence Placement Questionnaire. However, we are unable to make any guarantees of single-room placement.

If you have checked the box indicating your preference for a single room and are initially assigned a double room, you may still be reassigned to a single room before you move in.

Do marks affect my assignment?

No. For most students your marks do not affect your placement in residence.

Scholarship recipients receiving awards from Western's National Scholarship Program*, Schulich Leader Scholarships and/or

National Indigenous Scholarship are guaranteed their first choice of residence building and single-room accommodation in their first and second year.

Recipients of the Western Scholarship of Excellence are guaranteed one of their top three choices of residence building in their first and second year. Double or single room assignments are dependent on the random draw. Students will automatically be considered for the Western Scholarship of Excellence if you are admitted to an undergraduate program at Western's Main Campus directly from secondary school and are registered in first year full-time studies. No application is required.

Accepting your Residence Offer

You are required to pay a \$900 prepayment to accept your residence offer on or before the deadline date indicated in your academic offer.

It is important to complete the online Residence Placement Questionnaire at myhousing.uwo.ca on or before June 4, 2025.

Changes to any residence or lifestyle preferences received after June 11, 2025 may not be considered.

SOMETHING TO CONSIDER

Living in residence is not for everyone. Each of our residences accommodate a high-density population of diverse individuals. Some students find that the requirements for cooperation, consideration, compromise and respect for authority demanded by this high-density lifestyle difficult. We strongly encourage these individuals to consider alternate accommodation.

Residence Fees

DEADLINES

Your residence and tuition fees will be included on your statement of account in your Student Center (student.uwo.ca) once building assignments are released. Your Residence Contract and information regarding your residence building placement and move-in will be available in late July on the myHousing Portal (myhousing.uwo.ca). The first instalment of residence and tuition fees for first-year students is due by **August 1, 2025**. If your first instalment is not received by the deadline, your accommodation may be cancelled. For more information regarding payments and instalments, please visit the Registrar's Office website (registrar.uwo.ca).

CANCELLATION

Occasionally, students cancel their residence offer before the academic year commences. Half of the \$900 prepayment will be refunded if your notice of cancellation is received by the Housing Office no later than August 1, 2025. If you cancel your residence offer after that date, you will forfeit your \$900 residence prepayment.

Please note that in order to cancel your residence accommodation, you must complete the form on the myHousing portal. Please reach out to the Housing Office at housing@uwo.ca if you have any questions.

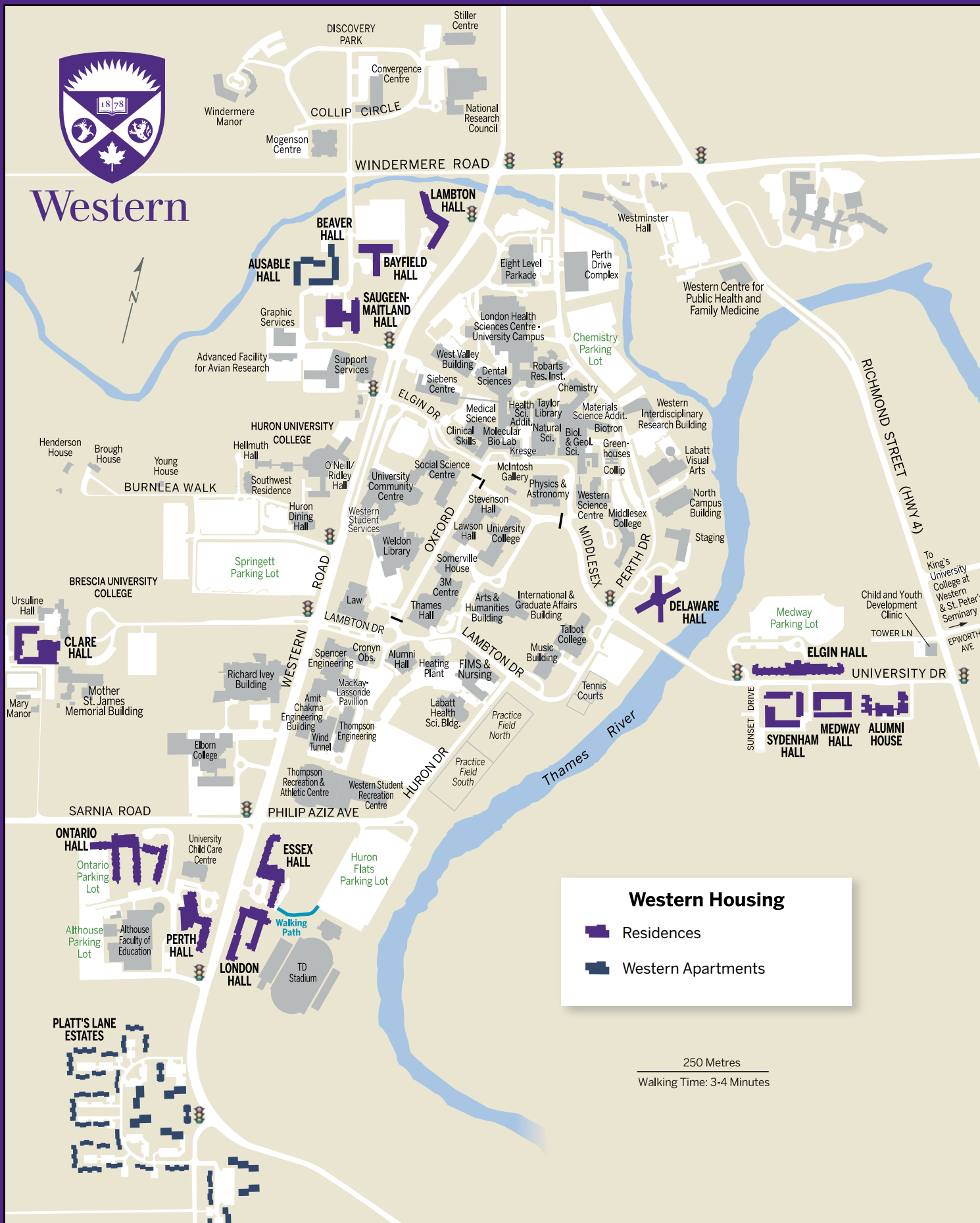
